REMISSION OF
PENALTIES.

An Act to amend the Act of the twenty-first year of the reign of King George the Third, chapter forty-nine, intituled "*An Act for preventing certain Abuses and Profanations on the Lord's Day called Sunday,*" and for further amending the law concerning the remission of penalties. [1st September, 1890.]

Preamble.

WHEREAS doubts are entertained as to the power of the Crown to remit penalties and forfeitures incurred under the Act of the twenty-first year of the reign of King George the Third, chapter forty-nine, and it is expedient to remove such doubts. Be it enacted by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of New South Wales in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

Remission of
penalties.

1. It shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, to remit in whole or in part any penalty, fine, or forfeiture imposed or recovered for any offence under the said Act, whether on indictment, information, or summary conviction, or by action, or any other process.

Short title.

2. This Act may be cited as the "Remission of Penalties Act, 1890."
