

MANLY HOSPITAL ACT.

Act No. 55, 1924.

An Act to sanction the construction of a public hospital at Manly; and for purposes connected therewith. [Assented to, 23rd December, 1924.]

BE it enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of New South Wales in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

1. This Act may be cited as the "Manly Hospital Act, 1924." short title.

2. The carrying out of the works described in the Schedule to this Act is hereby sanctioned, and the Secretary for Public Works is empowered to carry out the said works.

3. The cost of carrying out the said works, exclusive of land resumptions, is estimated at ninety-eight thousand four hundred and thirty pounds, and such estimated cost shall not, under any circumstances, be exceeded by more than ten per centum.

4. The plan of the works is the plan marked "Manly Peace Memorial Hospital," signed by the Secretary for Public Works and countersigned by the Acting Government Architect, and deposited in the public office of the said Secretary.

SCHEDULE.

No. 55. THE construction at Manly of a hospital consists of the following works :—

1. Administrative Block (2 storeys).
2. Ward Pavilion No. 1 (2 storeys), 85 beds, and Operating Block (1 storey).
3. Kitchen Block (Part 2 storey).
4. Children's Ward (1 storey), 12 beds.
5. Pathological Department (2 storeys).
6. Temporary Isolation Block (1 storey), 8 beds.
7. Laundry Block (1 storey).
8. Male Staff Quarters (1 storey).
9. Boiler House (1 storey).
10. Nurses' Quarters (3 storeys).
11. Morgue.

The buildings throughout, with the exception of the Temporary Isolation Block (which is to be of wood construction), are to be of brick with cavity walls—the roofs to be covered with tiles. The installation of electric light, hot and cold water services, heating, and sewerage is included.

The above is subject to such alterations and modifications as the Constructing Authorities may think advisable.
