Climate Change (Emissions Targets) Bill 2021

Explanatory note

This explanatory note relates to this Bill as introduced into Parliament.

Overview of Bill

The objects of this Bill are—

- (a) to establish principles to guide action to address climate change that must be taken into account by the NSW Government in developing and implementing government policy, and
- (b) to set 2030 and 2050 targets for the reduction of greenhouse gas emissions in New South Wales, and
- (c) to establish the Net Zero Commission to monitor and report on progress towards the 2030 and 2050 targets.

Outline of provisions

Part 1 Preliminary

Clause 1 sets out the name, also called the short title, of the proposed Act.

Clause 2 provides for the commencement of the proposed Act on the date of assent to the proposed Act.

Clause 3 provides that the proposed Act prevails to the extent of an inconsistency with another Act or law.

Clause 4 defines certain words and expressions used in the proposed Act.

Part 2 Greenhouse gas emissions reduction in NSW

Part 2 contains provisions that—

- (a) set out guiding principles relating to action to address climate change, and
- (b) establish greenhouse gas emissions reductions targets for NSW that must be met by 2030 and 2050, and
- (c) require the NSW Government to take the guiding principles and the 2030 and 2050 targets into account in developing and implementing government policy.

Part 3 NSW Net Zero Commission

Part 3 contains provisions relating to the NSW Net Zero Commission (the *Net Zero Commission*). The proposed Part—

- (a) establishes the Net Zero Commission and provides for its membership, and
- (b) sets out the functions of Net Zero Commission, including developing and reviewing a net zero plan, monitoring action taken by the NSW Government and making recommendations to the Minister administering the proposed Act, and
- (c) requires the NSW Government to respond to reports and recommendations from the Net Zero Commission.

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Part 2 Greenhouse gas emissions reduction in NSW

5 Guiding principles

- (1) For the purposes of this Act, the *guiding principles* are the principles set out in this section. 3 4
- (2) There is a critical need to act to address climate change, which is a serious threat to the social, economic and environmental well-being of the State. 5 6
- (3) Action to address climate change should be taken as early as possible to minimise its cost and adverse impact. 7 8
- (4) Action to address climate change should recognise principles of fiscal responsibility. 9
- (5) Action to address climate change should take into account the following— 10
 - (a) the need to maximise job creation and employment transition opportunities in relevant sectors and industries, including low carbon energy generation, supply chains and manufacturing, 11 12 13
 - (b) the need to ensure support for local communities affected by the action, including the diversification of local economies, the protection of local jobs and industries and the benefits of local procurement, 14 15 16
 - (c) the need for skills diversification, including technical and further education provided by TAFE. 17 18
- (6) Action to address climate change should be consistent with the right of all individuals to clean air and clean water. 19 20
- (7) In relation to current and future households, businesses, workers, communities and rural and regional NSW, action to address climate change should— 21 22
 - (a) ensure inter-generational equity, and 23
 - (b) take into account social, cultural and economic differences. 24
- (8) For the benefit of future generations, action to address climate change should maintain, conserve and enhance the health, integrity, biodiversity and productivity of the environment and natural ecosystems. 25 26 27
- (9) Action to address climate change should involve appropriate and adequate consultation with all affected persons, communities and stakeholders. 28 29
- (10) The NSW Government is responsible for— 30
 - (a) urgently developing strategies, policies and programs to address climate change, and 31 32
 - (b) ensuring that energy use in the NSW government sector represents best practice in addressing climate change. 33 34

6 2030 and 2050 greenhouse gas emissions targets

- (1) NSW must reduce greenhouse gas emissions to achieve zero net greenhouse gas emissions by 31 December 2050. 36 37
- (2) NSW must, by 31 December 2030, reduce greenhouse gas emissions to achieve at least a 50% reduction in net greenhouse gas emissions compared to net emissions in the year 2005. 38 39 40
- (3) The Premier and the Minister must ensure the 2030 target and the 2050 target are met. 41 42

- (1) The Net Zero Commission must prepare a report of its activities during each year. 8
 - (2) The report must include recommendations made to the Minister during the year. 9
 - (3) The report must be given to the Minister no later than 4 months after the end of the year. 10

- (1) The Minister must ensure the NSW Government responds to each annual report of the Net Zero Commission. 13

 - (2) The response must set out the following in relation to each recommendation in the report— 15
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 - (a) how the NSW Government intends to implement the recommendation, 17
 - (b) if the NSW Government intends not to implement the recommendation—the reasons for not implementing the recommendation. 18

 - (3) The Minister must give the Net Zero Commission’s annual report and the NSW Government response to the Presiding Officer of each House of Parliament within 28 days after receiving the report. 20
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
