Health Legislation Amendment (Miscellaneous) Bill 2025

Explanatory note

This explanatory note relates to this Bill as introduced into Parliament.

Overview of Bill

The object of this Bill is to make miscellaneous amendments to the following legislation—

- (a) the *Drug and Alcohol Treatment Act 2007*,
- (b) the *Health Practitioner Regulation (Adoption of National Law) Act 2009*,
- (c) the *Health Practitioner Regulation (New South Wales) Regulation 2016*,
- (d) the *Health Services Act 1997*,
- (e) the *Human Tissue Act 1983*,
- (f) the *Mental Health Act 2007*,
- (g) the *Private Health Facilities Act 2007*.

Outline of provisions

Clause 1 sets out the name, also called the short title, of the proposed Act.

Clause 2 provides for the commencement of the proposed Act.

Schedule 1 Amendment of Drug and Alcohol Treatment Act 2007 No 7

Schedule 1[1] aligns the qualifications for a person to be appointed as an official visitor with the qualifications for appointment as an official visitor under the *Mental Health Act 2007*.

Schedule 1[2] aligns the provisions concerning the qualifications of official visitors inspecting a drug and alcohol treatment facility with the equivalent provisions for the official visitors inspecting a mental health facility.

Schedule 2 Amendment of Health Practitioner Regulation (Adoption of National Law) Act 2009 No 86

Schedule 2[1] replaces the definitions of *professional services room* and *associated professional services room* with the definitions of *associated medication storage and preparation room* and *medication storage and preparation room*.

Schedule 2[2] and [3] make consequential amendments.

Schedule 3 Amendment of Health Practitioner Regulation (New South Wales) Regulation 2016

Schedule 3[1]–[5] make amendments consequential on Schedule 2.

Schedule 4 Amendment of Health Services Act 1997 No 154

Schedule 4[1] provides that local health district boards must include at least 1 person who identifies as an Aboriginal person.

Schedule 4[2] inserts proposed section 67KA to provide that the Health Secretary may charge a fee to private health facility operators that book patient transport services provided by the Ambulance Service.

Schedule 5 Amendment of Human Tissue Act 1983 No 164

Schedule 5 inserts proposed section 27DA to clarify that a person who is a senior available next of kin may delegate the person's functions under the *Human Tissue Act 1983*.

Schedule 6 Amendment of Mental Health Act 2007 No 8

Schedule 6[1] and [2] make amendments to clarify that the Secretary may impose conditions on the appointment of a person as an accredited person under the *Mental Health Act 2007*.

Schedule 7 Amendment of Private Health Facilities Act 2007 No 9

Schedule 7[2] makes an amendment to the staffing requirements for private health facilities to allow prescribed facilities to operate with registered midwives on duty rather than registered nurses.

Schedule 7[3] makes an amendment to allow regulations to be made to require the medical advisory committee of a private health facility to be expanded to include additional members and to allow the facility operator to include additional appropriate persons on the committee.

Schedule 7[1] and [4] make consequential amendments.



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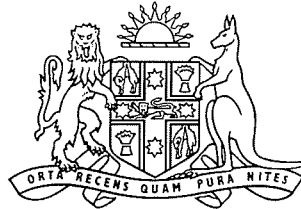

Insert after section 26(4)—

- (4A) At least 1 member of a local health district board must be a person who identifies as an Aboriginal person.

[2] Section 67KA

Insert after section 67K—

67KA Health Secretary may charge booking and cancellation fees

- (1) The Health Secretary may charge a private provider a fee for the following activities—

- (a) making a booking for ambulance services,
- (b) cancelling a booking for ambulance services within—
 - (i) 4 hours before the time the service was to be provided, or
 - (ii) 1 hour after the time the service was to be provided.

- (2) A fee charged under this section must be the fee set out for the activity in the scale of fees published under section 67L.

- (3) A service that is not provided because the patient was not ready or available to be transported within 1 hour after the time the services were to be provided is taken to have been cancelled for subsection (1)(b).

- (4) In this section—

residential care home has the same meaning as in the *Aged Care Act 2024* of the Commonwealth.

private provider means the following—

- (a) the licensee of a private health facility,
- (b) the operator of a residential care home,
- (c) a provider, or a class of provider, of health services prescribed by the regulations.

37 Mandatory staffing requirements for private health facilities

- (1) The licensee of a private health facility must, at all times there is a patient at the facility, ensure there is—
 - (a) for a facility prescribed by the regulations—a midwife on duty, or
 - (b) otherwise—a registered nurse on duty.Maximum penalty—1,000 penalty units.
- (2) The licensee of a private health facility must ensure that—
 - (a) for a facility prescribed by the regulations—a midwife is appointed to be responsible for the care of patients at the facility (the *director of midwifery*), or
 - (b) otherwise—a registered nurse is appointed to be responsible for the care of patients at the facility (the *director of nursing*).Maximum penalty—1,000 penalty units.
- (3) The licensee of a private health facility must ensure that a vacancy in the position of director of midwifery or director of nursing for the facility is filled within 7 days, or another period prescribed by the regulations, after the vacancy occurs.
Maximum penalty—1,000 penalty units.
- (4) The licensee of a private health facility must, except as provided by the regulations, give the Secretary written notice in accordance with this section of the name and qualifications of the person appointed as director of midwifery or director of nursing for the facility.
Maximum penalty—50 penalty units.
- (5) A notice under subsection (4) must be given before the person is appointed or, if that is not practicable, immediately after the person's appointment.
- (6) The regulations may—
 - (a) prescribe the minimum necessary qualifications for a person to be appointed as the director of midwifery or director of nursing for a private health facility, and
 - (b) prescribe information that must accompany a notice under subsection (4).
- (7) Nothing in this Act prevents the licensee of a private health facility, if qualified, from carrying out the duties of director of midwifery or director of nursing for the facility.

(8)	It is a defence to the prosecution of an offence under this section if the person charged proves that the person took all reasonable steps to comply with the relevant requirements under this section.	1 2 3
